Michigan hospitals are extending care, services and resources beyond the traditional hospital setting to help enhance the quality of life for residents throughout the state. Michigan hospitals helped more than **9 million state residents*** through voluntary community benefit services and programs. When combined with other voluntary community activities, Michigan hospitals invested nearly **\$776 million** in community-based activities*. A snapshot of these activities is highlighted below.



The site, created voluntarily by the MHA and its member hospitals, provides visitors with information on infection rates, readmissions, mortality, early elective deliveries and more. Caring for all Patients

Michigan hospitals are dedicated to providing patients and their families with high-quality, cost-effective care. As a safety net for the uninsured and underinsured, Michigan hospitals care for all who walk through their doors, regardless of their ability to pay.

The unpaid cost of patient care totaled more than **\$2.3 billion**, an increase compared to data reported last year.



Delivering cost-effective care

A survey from the American Hospital Association, also using 2016 data, shows that the cost of an inpatient admission in a Michigan hospital is 10.6 percent lower than the national average for a comparable admission and 9.5 percent lower than the average cost in hospitals in the other Great Lakes states (Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin).



Making a Difference



The Healthy Michigan Plan, Michigan's Medicaid expansion program, is making a difference in the lives of more than 687,000 Michigan residents. The successful and innovative program is doing exactly what it was designed to do: save money by reducing uncompensated care and improving the health status of men and women who could not afford health insurance in the past.

Strengthening the State Economy

Healthcare continues to be among the state's largest private-sector employers, and hospitals throughout the state often serve as one of their communities' largest job providers.


In 2016, 19 of every 100 jobs in Michigan were directly or indirectly related to or induced by healthcare. These jobs generated \$58 billion a year in wages, salaries and benefits and \$17 billion a year in tax revenue for a combined total value of \$76 billion*.


Leading the Way to Healthy Communities

The 2018 Community Benefit Report highlights how Michigan hospitals are working in local communities to help people of all ages get healthy and stay healthy both in and out of the hospital.

According to the most recent data available, Michigan hospitals provided more than **\$3 billion** in total community benefits in fiscal year (FY) 2016. These efforts include preventive services, community partnerships, the preparation of future healthcare professionals, uncompensated care, research and clinical trials, programs that impact well-being and health status, and efforts to meet the health needs of the uninsured, low-income and other vulnerable populations.

The report also highlights how hospitals are helping strengthen Michigan's economy. Our teaching hospitals and academic medical centers serve as important training grounds for future healthcare leaders. In many communities, the local hospital is the leading source of jobs and helps support other locally owned healthcare-related businesses.

These innovative community-based partnerships help improve the overall health, wellness and quality of life of Michigan residents.



Data are based on responses to the 2016 and 2017 MHA Community Benefits Surveys, which gathered information from fiscal years 2015 and 2016 from 128 hospitals. Please note that the organizations in each cohort may not be the same from year-to-year.
